- MAT 093 completion (or equivalent) or Accuplacer placement testing into MAT 097 (test dated 9/1/2023 and after) or completion of a higher-level math course.
- Minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00
- Submit official high school or high school equivalency (GED / HiSET / TASC) due May 22,2025.
- Submit official college transcripts including any coursework completed Spring 2025- due May 22,2025
 - o Show proof of completion or in-progress status by February 14th, 2025 to be considered for an interview for the PTA program

Important Applicant Notes:

- Applicants who have completed ENG 101 more than five years prior to beginning the program may have this requirement waived by placing into ENG 101 on the Morton College English placement exam (dated 9/1/2023 and after) or if they have completed ENG 102 during or after the Fall 2020 semester.
- Applicants who have completed Medical Terminology more than five years prior to beginning the program or with credit hours
 that do not transfer to Morton College may have this requirement waived by passing the PHT 101 placement exam with a "C"
 or better, following the Morton College (PHT 101) grading scale (dated 9/1/2023 and after) by the end of Spring 2025 semester.
- A criminal background check (requiring a Social Security Number) drug screen and a physical examination are required for second year clinicals.
- Please see catalog for full course titles and descriptions.
- A minimum grade of 75% is required in ALL courses in order to continue in the PTA program. Successful completion of ALL
 clinical affiliations is also required.
- A student may be eligible for readmission to the program only **once**, see the readmission policy in the PTA student handbook. Readmission is not guaranteed.
- Clinical affiliations are scheduled during the sophomore academic year. Since approved sites are located in many areas, students are responsible for their own transportation and any other clinical costs.
- It is highly recommended that all students interested in the PTA program meet with the healthcare student success coach for planning.
- Applying and meeting minimum admission requirements does not guarantee admission into the program. Ultimate selection
 is determined by the PTA Admissions Committee.

Licensure:

All Morton College PTA graduates must apply for and pass the licensure exam in order to practice as a physical therapist assistant in the state of Illinois. Graduation from the program does not guarantee a passing score on the NPTE for the PTA.

During the final semester, you will be given more information about application for licensure and an examination preparatory course is usually offered to assist in your success. There are instances when the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR) may refuse to issue a license. Applicants convicted of a felony or misdemeanor may have difficulty obtaining a license. It is your responsibility to obtain more information on the licensure process and to review the list of potential situations where the IDFPR may refuse to issue a license; you are advised to contact the IDFPR in Springfield, Illinois by phone at (217) 785-0800 or on their website at (www.idfpr.iillinois.gov).

NOTE: Students enrolling in instructional programs with state and/or federal licensure requirements, including residency and employment eligibility requirements, should contact the appropriate regulatory agency prior to enrolling in classes.
